

A GIRL'S TRUE SPHERE.

MARRIAGE NOT BY ANY MEANS THE ONLY COURSE FOR HER.

Judge Pryor's Estimable Wife Gives Her Opinion on How Girls Should Be Trained-What She Herself Has Done Mistakes in Notions of Girlhood

What have women done? I know what these fingers have done. To re-member all carries me back to Virginia through the most exciting pages of American history. They were trained to do elegant embroidery and to play well the best classical music. During the Civil war and since they have done everything that fingers could do. In war times they plaited and sewed my children's hats, made all their garments, even little kid and cloth boots, while their father was in prison.

After the struggle, in the experiment we made to earn a living, these hands copied briefs for the lawyer, then too poor to afford a clerk, the while sewing poor to afford a clerk, the wine sewing for the seven dear children. They made every robe from the christening to the bridal for my two elder daughters, and the work in which they have engaged since has been most varied.

Woman's sphere is where the Lord has placed her. We all deplore the condi-tions that reduce young children and tender women to hard labor for which they have neither fitness nor strength, but I believe that things adjust themselves in the end and we mold circum-stances till we find our level. Home is a sweet place, but it is not the only place, nor are maternal the only duties of womanhood. Life is made up of a series of conditions, and the talents of men and women are equally varied.

EDUCATION IS NECESSARY.

I deny that woman needs a special training for what you are pleased to term the profession of motherhood. Maternal love is innate. It is a part of woman's nature. She may be a hoiden in her youth, a heartless lover or a treacherous friend, false to every trust, and still be a good mother. Even the savage brute is kind to her young, and will risk her life in protecting it. I believe that the training and education necessary to the perfect development of womanhood will fit the girl for any sphere in life she chooses to enter.

I do not believe that marriage is all this world holds for the sex, nor that a wife should round herself to the four walls of her home. It is necessary for the height and breadth and freshness of its atmosphere that she go out, mix with the elements and become imbued with the spirit, the progress, the thought that is accelerating the motion of the earth.

The world is moving with a velocity so great that one cannot afford to stand still, and the mother must be up and about and around, even if she is obliged to take her little brood with her, to watch the swelling tide. I am always so glad to welcome the young woman in any new line. When I take up the news-paper I begrudge the valuable space given to the reports of the Four Hundred. do not care to read about their coats of arms, their coaches and coquetry. want to know what the brave, bright gifted young men and women are doing and thinking about and striving for.

This talk about girls losing their femininity and unsexing themselves in industrial enterprises I think idle and senseless. The very word "unsex" is to me a misnomer, and if a woman becomes coarse and bold and rough in business, in the art world or in the industrial school she would not be a lady in a parlor or a gentlewoman in any con-dition. The decollete dress does not make a woman vulgar.

MISTAKEN TRAINING. The girl who stands behind the counter to serve us and the one who stands be-hind the footlights to entertain us may have the same nobility of purpose and the same lofty principles as the one privileged to ill use and criticise her. It is barely possible that our ladies do go to Delmonico's for dinner or supper, that they are even reckless enough to sip a glass of wine, and at the same time be as intrinsically worthy and noble as the woman in quiet russet garments who the window.

That our girls want training there is not a doubt, neither has the inability of some mothers been questioned. They don't want piano lessons unless there is an inborn love of music. The piano has been the ruination of more than one generation of women. Another fallacy is the hitherto universal tendency to di rect all energies to marriage. In the suth as soon as a daughter reached her young ladyhood the mother at once proceeded to refurnish the house.

The girl went to the hair dresser and

had her tresses arranged in a dozen differ-ent ways to find out which would be the most becoming style; colors were tried against her pretty face to get "her color;" she took her beauty naps, and from every source, even the old servant, a hint "to be sweet."

In discussing a new acquaintance or heard that she was very "beautiful and clever and nice, but she was not pretty." Being what we called "pretty" was con-sidered a superior virtue, and everything in the girl's training tended to this one

characteristic.

ADVERTISING IN ALL AGES.

Means of Announcing Warea Before the Day of the Newspaper.

The wise in the business world have

for many ages availed themselves of the science of advertising. One of the most ancient modes of attracting public patronage was by means of public criers long before the age of printing. The mediæval criers used to carry a horn with which to fix the attention of the people when about to make a proclama-tion or publication. They formed a well organized body in France as early as the Twelfth century. Under a charter from Louis VII they were entitled to a penny for every time they blew their horns and could force themselves upon tavern keepers to cry their wares under a ger eral statute. They at a very early period formed themselves into a corporation, and in 1258 obtained from Philip Augustus favorable statutes of the most tyrannical kind.

In England the public criers appear to have been a national institution at an early period. They cried all kinds of goods, and were sworn to tell "truly and well to the best of their ability and power." After a while the bellman or town crier was appointed for the benefit of the community at large. In most of the country towns of Great Britain, and even in London, there are still bellmen and parish criers, though their offices are little more than sinecures. The provincial crier's duties are of the most varied description, and relate to objects lost or found, sales by public auction or private contract, weddings, christenings or funerals.

But the bellman as a means of advertising has seen his last days. Nearly three-quarters of a century ago in England wagons were driven through the streets surmounted by revolving turrets on which were painted flaming annonncements of coming events, and men on horseback rode up and down the principal thoroughfares with great bill boards strapped on either side of them to attract public attention.

The first regular newspaper, The Certain News of This Present Week, published in London in 1622, contained no advertisements; but in 1682 advertisements appeared in something like the present form in The Mercurius Politicus. Books were the articles earliest adver-tised. The great plague in London brought forth the first medical advertisements. In 1700 Addison, reviewing the advertisements of his time, speaks of their "cuts and figures." The London Times was established in 1788, but did little to reduce advertising to a system though it demonstrated its value importance. The first American daily journal, The Independent Gazette, of New York, in 1787, in its second year contained thirty-four advertisements. From that time on the growth ments. From that this of the solution of American advertising developed the fact that extensive advertising was localizated in the solution of a legitimate necessity to trade. The other great metropolitan papers founded since 1833 have greatly popularized advertising. A special feature adopted about this time was "business notices" and "special notices," commanding high prices.-Washington Star.

the safest anæsthetic—only one death having occurred out of 50,000 administrations. Ether is probably safer than chloroform in the ratio of one to three or one to five, and the best method of administering it is to use the inhaler made of cloth stretched across the wire frame which is surrounded by rubber or leather. Plenty of fresh air should be mixed with the ether. Chloroform is probably

more fatal on account of its greater specific gravity. It lies in the lungs and mixes slowly with the air, completely poisoning the nerve centers before oxy-gen can gain admission to the blood. It s less dangerous in hot climates, where it is more readily volatilized. Ether is more volatile and therefore less danger-ons.—New York Commercial Advertiser. A Bad Sign. I wish to ask this puzzled butter maker a few questions, and if she can answer any one in the afirmative she has at least one solution to the bad taste of her butter:

If so lo you only strain through the coarse nent accumulate in the fine seams of the milk pans or cans? Are your milk vessels washed in doubtful water and sed without being scalded? Is your milk room poorly ventilated? Is food with strong odors, such as fish, vegeta-bles and meat, placed in the same room with the milk?

Experiments in Cream Raising. The Cornell University Experiment station has made a series of experimenta in setting milk for cream raising by different methods, the results of which, as nmarized in Bulletin No. 20 of that station, are as follows: In eleven trials where the milk was set in the Cooley creamer with ice water at a temperature of 44 degs, the average per cent, of fat n the skim milk was .23; in eleven trials where milk was diluted with an equal veight of cold water and set in the open air the average per cent. of fat in the kim milk was 1.38; in six trials where milk was diluted with 20 and 50 per cent. of cold water the average per cent. of fat in the skim milk was 1.24; in ten trials where milk was diluted with 10 to 00 per cent. of its weight of hot water the average per cent. of fat in the skim milk was 1.11; in two trials where milk was in deep cans without dilution, in running water at 60 degs, to 63 degs., the average per cent. of fat in the skim milk was .89: in two trials where milk was set in shallow cans, at 60 degs. and 64 degs., the average per cent, of fat in the kim milk was .48; in one trial where milk was set in shallow pans, and one third of its weight of water at 120 degs. added, the per cent. of fat in the skim milk was .75.—Science.

New Way of Testing Milk. We again have a bulletin introducing a new method of estimating the fat in milk. This one consists of test bottles with graduated necks, a pipette for measuring the milk, a glass acid measure and a centrifugal machine, a kero-sene gas lamp and commercial sulphuric icid. The only cost is the sulphuric acid, except when a bottle is broken by accident. I never found any help for the difficulty until last March, nearly a year ago, when I read an article from the pe of Smith B. Morrison, of Fort Atkinson, in which he stated that he used in such ases fifteen or twenty drops tincture aconite, given on an ear of corn. I also saw it recommended frequently by others in different places. As a drowning man grasps at straws, I hurriedly procured a vial of "the rank poison," and administered a dose to the first cow that was affected, when, lo and behold at the next milking she was all right. Soon another was affected. I gave another dose, and at the next milking all was well. In a little while another co was troubled badly. She required two doses, twelve hours apart, when she was well. Mind you, I don't say it cured her, for I don't know. I am telling what know now, and not what I guess. Soon a neighbor came over and said she had a cow with a very bad udder, so and in fact that it was feared she could not recover. I gave her a full dose of twenty drops, and told her to give another dose in the morning. She returned the next day and said the cow was very much better and wanted to know the name of the wonderful medicine. I told her, and she got some and the cow was soon well. I could enumerate many instances if it were necessary, but I forbear. I keep a small bottle of it in the barn all the time, and so confident of its efficacy have we become in our "ignoance" that we administer a dose whe ever occasion requires, and seldom give the matter a second thought, for it is a rare case that requires a second dose.— E. A Butter Extractor and Cream Separator At the Wisconsin agricultural experiment station Professor Babcock has been testing a new machine for extracting butter. The cream separating and butter extracting machines are chiefly Swedish and Danish inventions, and they are being adopted slowly in Amer ica. The creamery man is conservative, like the farmer, and justly so. Mis-

takes are costly.

The machine tested by Dr. Babcock was one that could be used both as a cream operator and butter extractor.
For producing butter it fed milk at the
rate of 1,200 pounds an hour and turned out a fine article. It was a steam pow machine. But the butter made by it was "sweet"—that is to say, the milk was sweet when the butter was extracted. The butter fat is extracted so closely from the milk that in one case not more

than 18-100 of 1 per cent was left in. The butter extractor would work with perfect satisfaction if only Americans would buy butter made from swee milk, of which the people of Europe are so fond. But it will not act on sour, thick cream. Cream of any ripeness can be made into butter by first mixing it twice its quantity of water or skim mixture to 60 degs., then running it through the machine. The butter that esults is of the "ripened" cream flavor in demand in America, and it is ex-

Henry Stewart gives suggestions in The American Agriculturist about how to prepare for the more profitable winter dairying. Preparations should be made well ahead. Mr. Stewart says:

It is easier to keep a dairy warm in the winter by artificial heat from a stove than it is to cool it in the summer by than it is to cool it in the summer by means of ice. One pound of ice will cool —that of Children's and Misses exhibited before in this city. than it is to cool it in the summer by means of ice. One pound of ice will cool only ten pounds of milk 14 degs., and when ice is one cent per pound ten pounds of milk cost one cent for the cooling of it. But one pound of coal will produce more than 500 times as much heat as the ice produces cold, so to speak, for it will evaporate 9½ pounds of water requiring 990 units of heat, so that one pound of coal will produce an equivalent of heat equal to 990x9½, against 142 of cold produced by the melting of ice. The very great economy of heat used in the winter as compared with the use of ice for cooling in the summer is thus remarkably apparent.

What are wanted for the pursuit of winter dairying are the fresh cows to calve in September, a weatherproof dairy house and a warm barn. No artificial warmth is necessary in the barn. Warm water, even, is not required for the very best economical results. If the space is not excessive well fed cows will keep the air warm enough by radiation of heat to prevent freezing in the stable, except in the very coldest weather. A barn built on the same plan as a dwelling house, lined inside with close fitting boards, with tarred roofing paper under it, a beauty, modest and correct.



He reported "plenty of milk of poor quality re-ceived;" gave as a reason that "if it was refused the cheese factory across the way would take it and ask no questions." If the proprietors of each of these cream-eries and cheese factories would agree to buy no milk of the other's patrons without ascertaining their reasons of wishing to leave, and if the reason was because complaint had been made about the quality of the milk, they should not be received as a patron of either creamery.
A close inspection at the weighing vat could at once eliminate all the poor milk from these two factories.

A disposition on the part of the factory people to enlarge their business at the expense of their competitors has always had a strong tendency to degenerate the quality of the goods, and, on the other hand, if individual creameries seemed to agree too well and enforce stringent regulations as to the quality of the milk or cream, the patron becomes dissatisfied It is generally those that have been selling thin milk or milk of poor quality that are opposed on general principles to any rules that place them on an equality These patrons commenced an agita-





Butter that is shipped to other countries always runs a risk of spoiling by being packed in the wooden tubs or any other material capable of absorbing the brine and salt. Butter of a superior quality is ruined if packed in the very best wooden tubs. The price of the best wood makes it impossible to manufacture tubs out of it for the small sum obtainable for butter firkins and tubs.
